Opening and Introductions; Background on Policy Proposal

Celia Johnson, SAG Facilitator

- IL-TRM Administrator requested that these policy issues be discussed in SAG.
- SAG Facilitator received comments from seven parties.
- Redline edits were submitted using two different documents, which is why there are two documents posted on the SAG website.
- Water issue (#1) will not be discussed since it was already incorporated in IL-TRM Version 7.0.
- Process / next steps any policy changes agreed to are expected to be memorialized in an updated IL-TRM Policy Document, and discussed by the Policy Manual Subcommittee.

Discuss Comments on Policy Proposal

MEEA Presentation on Code Compliance Study (Alison Lindburg, MEEA)

- MEEA is starting work on a code compliance study in IL. This presentation is for information on those efforts.
- Across the country codes are not 100% complied with. Enhancing code compliance has been shown to save energy. Claimed savings as an idea has been around for five years.
- MEEA is planning to measure the actual savings (vs deemed savings).
- In the states of KY, MO, and MI MEEA has completed similar non-compliance studies. The five large IL utilities are our partners for this study.
- Work includes two field studies, residential and commercial, as well as a stakeholder collaborative. The collaborative will help with answering the "why" lack of compliance, to better understand energy savings potential.
- We have had collaborative meetings and conducted a survey of members to identify the biggest issues.
- Residential field study began with DOE which funded 3-year residential energy code studies.
- Calculate potential savings, focused on training and support to improve compliance, then conduct another study in the field (phase III) so you can actually measure the savings.
- Using random sampling plan and protocol that is established by DOE.
- March 2019 is target goal for data collection, but no reporting until Dec 2019 (PNL will be conducting analysis before the report-out).
- For commercial, will be including a high-rise multifamily (low-rise is being covered by another DOE study).
- IL is updating to the 2018 Code in March 2019.
- This study is designed to be complementary to any training the state is already doing.

Q&A

Chris Neme, representing NRDC: Are you trying to document the current baseline? What is the first year you would imagine utilities would submit a savings plan for buildings? Will an independent evaluator confirm the savings numbers.

- A: Not sure, but MEEA has created programs in other states, so we could create something in IL. We need to see what the study finds. Will know more at the end of 2019. Potentially as early as 2020 utilities could put forth a plan.
- A: Yes, an evaluator would review the savings.

SAG Facilitator Request for Discussion on Policy Proposal

- Jim Jerozal, Nicor Gas: Suggests this discussion should be part of the Policy Manual Subcommittee process.
- Jim Jerozal, Nicor Gas: Suggests there be a "policy check" included in the IL-TRM update process, if there are future updates needed to the IL-TRM Policy Document.
- Darren Meyers, IECC LLC: Suggests re-organizing the materials / comments for ease of review.
- Other participants suggested that substantive comments on the Policy Proposal should be reserved for the Policy Manual Subcommittee meeting.
