Job Impact Quantification - Approach

- Opinion Dynamics portfolio evaluation plan outlines approach to quantifying job benefits from the AIC programs
 - We plan to assess job impacts a portfolio level
- We plan to use IMPLAN software to estimate job impacts
 - IMPLAN is a relatively cost-effective tool; Navigant is also planning to use it
 - AIC and ComEd evaluation teams plan to ensure that our models and methodology align to the degree possible
- Considerations for future years
 - If there is an desire from stakeholders and/or AIC to produce a more granular estimate of job impacts or economic impacts, we will consider developing a more detailed model



Job Impact Quantification - Deliverables & Timeline

Deliverables

- We expect to deliver results that quantify the change in employment as a result of the 2018 AIC portfolio, including:
 - First-year job impacts (impacts from benefits realized in 2018)
 - Lifetime job impacts (impacts from benefits realized over the life of energy efficiency measures)

Timeline

- The inputs required for jobs modeling make it most efficient to conduct this analysis simultaneously along with cost-effectiveness
- We expect to provide results in our annual cost-effectiveness report for the AIC portfolio -- anticipated no later than September 30, 2019
- Note: we do not expect to use any results from our 2018 job impact analysis as an input to cost-effectiveness

Early Coordination: Ameren and ComEd Evaluation Teams

- Met to share draft plans; assess similarities in our plans and approaches
 - Gathering IL-specific data, in response to prior SAG process outcomes
 - Focusing on establishing program-level NEI values
 - Working towards the goal of aligning methodologies
- Proposed 2018/2019 research activities focusing on similar breadth of NEI categories

NEI Research Approach for Ameren – Key Objectives

- Overarching Objective: Support the development of a statewide research approach to NEIs, balancing the needs for consistency across utilities with the unique context of different jurisdictions and portfolios
- Planned Evaluation Objectives:
 - Complete Ameren Illinois' first NEI assessments
 - Leverage planned 2018-2020 evaluation activities where possible
 - Complete a phased research effort
 - 2018: Develop a framework to organize NEI activities in this program cycle, and begin work
 - 2019-2021: Execute the framework to produce a complete NEI assessment



NEI Research Approach for Ameren – 2018 Research Questions

- 1. Which AIC 2018-2021 programs and initiatives are likely to produce NEIs? Which NEIs might result from each initiative? How do initiative activities produce these NEIs?
- 2. Which NEIs can be qualitatively assessed for programs in the AIC portfolio? Which can be quantified? To inform future cost-effectiveness testing, which NEIs could be monetized, and how?
- 3. How applicable are available NEI assessment methods and researched values to the AIC service territory, including those put forth by other Illinois evaluators? What adjustments may be needed to reflect the AIC context?
- 4. Which NEIs are most suitable for an initial quantitative assessment?
- 5. What types of survey data are needed to quantify key participant NEIs for AIC's residential programs? Do 2018 participants perceive changes in these outcomes, as applicable to the upgrades they have made or received?
- 6. What data and information are needed to support future NEI assessments?

Initial 2018 Program Areas

Per draft evaluation plan, focusing our 2018 activity on three programs:

- Income Qualified (Single- and Multi-Family)
 - Community Action Agency in-depth interviews
 - Participant surveys (single-family, multi-family)
- Multi-Family (Market-Rate)
 - Participating property manager survey
 - Survey of tenants living in upgraded properties
- Public Housing
 - Public Housing Authority representative in-depth interviews
 - Public housing property manager in-depth interviews

 - Leveraging existing work in Illinois and elsewhere

 - Job impacts, utility impacts (e.g., arrears), and others
 - Explicitly consider negative NEIs
